The Covid-19 pandemic and the sudden escalation in the shrinking of the civic space are fundamental parts of the several events and experiences touching practically every human life and society across the global community between the years 2019 and 2020 which raised unprecedented and very significant questions about human life and society in modern times. The situation seems to compel all actors of all spheres of human endeavors not only to examine new issues, but to as well learn new ways of doing whatever is result-oriented which pertains to human life and existence generally.

Ahead of the year 2022, therefore, the new-normal thus necessitated series of retreats for re-strategizing for us as a civil society organization with a mission towards a better humanity according to the divine plan. The overall focus of the organization therefore in planning for 2022 involved the courageous and resilient effort to solve newly emerging issues which have significant implication on the various programmes of the organization. It also included efforts to understand the new situation through the lenses of justice, human rights and welfare, democracy and communal peace and human capital development, how they shape the foreseeable future and how various interventions can order towards the best outcome for our immediate as well as the global community.

It was thus incumbent on each programme of the organization to re-examine the relevance of all the hitherto plans and strategies set forth within each project to determine the level of new initiatives required to ensure that they all achieve their goals in the long run. Such activities focused on project re-evaluation, project designing, networking with partners, advocacy and dialogues with stakeholders, public sensitization and education, training and empowerment of key stakeholders, organizational strengthening through improvement in her resilience index, human capital development initiatives, emergency relief support, strengthening of hitherto efforts in the fights against corruption and abuse of human rights especially the growth of despotism and bullying in socio-political atmosphere.

Although all of these meant deployment of more human and material resources that could only accrue from unprecedented sense patriotisms, passion for common good globally, these were not wanting not just because of the unflinching commitment of staff, partners and various stakeholders to our initiatives but also because these various stakeholders brought forth innumerable initiatives that have significant effects on the planning and the outcome of the programme of the organization for the year 2021 and prepared it for the year 2022.

The year 2022 would hardly be different from the year 2021 in terms of its interest. 
HUMAN RESOURCES

In the line of hierarchy, the Bishop is the legal holder. The General Coordinator represents the Legal Holder who is also the sole Trustee in the day-to-day running of the organization. There are fourteen members' advisory board and legal advisers. The Assistant Coordinator deputizes the General Coordinator and carry on with the day-to-day administration of the organization in his absence. He is also saddled with the responsibility of managing all programmes and reporting to the General Coordinator who in turn reports to the Legal holder for final decision as recommended by the Advisory Board.

The Organization operates four programme department apart from its Finance and Administrative Department that has the responsibility of managing the Human and material resources, procure and supply of office needs as well as rendering assistance and relief services to the physically challenged on emergency situations. This department reports directly to the General Coordinator. The Integrated and Human Development Department work in the area of Women and Youth empowerment, Preventive Health Care, and microfinance scheme.

The Democracy and Good Governance operates in the area of Democracy awareness, voters' education, election monitoring and observation, political leadership and budget monitoring. The Justice and Human Rights Department is responsible for providing Legal assistance to indigent awaiting trial persons, advocating and lobbying for human rights, awareness creation and education on Human rights and peace building. The Rural Development Departments operates in the area of providing technical trainings on modern Agricultural practices and community development, advocating for farmers' rights and sustainable agricultural practices.











STAFF STRENGHT IN PERCENTAGE





YOUTH EMPOWERMENT

Technical Skill Development Project (TDSP) 2021, a technical and vocational training Programme for targeted Youths in Osun State was funded by ITF and NECA with counterpart funding from the Catholic Diocese of Osogbo and Catholic archdiocese of Lagos. The youth empowerment project had set out to offer one-year training to 70 youths in either carpentry or hospitality management.



32 youths completed their training in catering and hospitality management and 17 were trained in carpentry. They included 19 males and 30 females. While 70 youths were screened and admitted for training (20 in carpentry and 50 in catering and Hospitality), 62 eventually resumed, and 49 completed their training within the originally stipulated one year. Eleven (two in carpentry and nine in catering) are undergoing extra three months training to upgrade them to certifiable standards of the training institutes while four left before the end of the training voluntarily. Three of those who left got admission in the universities and a polytechnic and one left because for ill-health.

Training and Certification

Carpentry

20 youths were admitted for carpentry, only 17 have completed the full training. The training programme covered Wood Appreciation and Joinery for a span of 12 months. Below are the details of the training programme



i. Woods Appreciation

The first five months of the training was committed solely to this introductory aspect. It involved developing knowledge in recognizing types of woods, Sizes and Use of vary kinds of Woods, Treatment of Wood, Sawing, Planing, Chiselling, sanding sealing, hammering and Cutting of Woods.

ii. Joinery

This second part of the training focused on training the youths on the use of fasteners, bindings, adhesives etc., learning dove tail joints, laminated skills, mortice and tennon joint, gluing, nailing, screwing, measuring and marking out. etc. This final aspect developed their skills for final production output. The output capacity of each trained youth depended on passion, efforts put in and each individual's application of personal talent.

Catering and Hospitality Management

50 youths were admitted for Catering and Hospitality Management, and only 41 underwent the full training. However, at the end of the One-Year training programme, only 32 were certified based on the standard of the Centre. The remaining 9 are undergoing extra months retraining to raise their capacity to certifiable standard. The One-Year Training programme entailed both theory and practical classes. The Theory and Practical Programmes ran simultaneously throughout the One-Year training period.

Theory Classes

1. Food and Beverage Production (CHM 101):

The course covered kitchen practices. Trainees were exposed to kitchen practices like planning and equipment in a standard kitchen, purchase, use and maintenance of various kitchen equipment, food commodities, and menu planning and types.

2. Food and Beverage Service (CHM 103):

The course exposed the trainees to the processes of preparing, presenting, and serving of food and beverages to customers.

3. English Language and Communication Skills (CHM 105):

The course helped trainees to improve their communication skills, pick up their body languages, intonations and accents especially when conversing with customers. Also, it improved their capacity to prepare catering services proposals and quotations.

4. Basic Nutrition and Hygiene (CHM 107):

Trainees were formed to develop very high sense of hygiene required in the Hospitality industry as it pertains to food preparation, serving and preservation. It also trained them on the basic chemical contents of food and drinks.

5. Catering Costing and Calculation (CHM 109):

The course exposed trainees to simple calculations needed in catering services, the three important aspects of food costing (price, recipe mix, and tracking), how to monitor their costs, measurements involved in catering and how to prevent wastage.

6. Etiquette (CHM 111):

The course built the capacity of trainees in the art of human interaction in the Hospitality industry among staff, hoteliers, guests and customers. They were taught formal rules and manners that are considered sacred and acceptable in the society are needed to interact with one another.

7. Introduction to Hospitality Industry (CHM 113):

The course dealt with, meaning and overview of hospitality management, segments of hospitality industry, business in hospitality industry, information systems in hospitality, and terminologies in hospitality industry. It also acquainted the trainees with knowledge of activities in hospitality industry.

Practical Classes

1. Food and Beverage Production Practical (CHM 102):

The course offered practical training to in the preparation of various food and drinks. It taught them art of preparing at least three types of local food and soups from each of the geographical zones of Nigeria. It also taught them preparation of international foods, baking and preparation of various types of pastries and snacks. This aspect of the programme as well entailed individual and group preparation of food to access capacity of all trainees. It also enabled the trainees put into practice the skills they have learnt in beverage production, hospitality management and organization, and marketing.

2. Food and Beverage Service Practical (CHM 104):

Food and Beverage Service Practical developed the capacity of the trainees to provide high quality food and beverages, to provide friendly and welcoming atmosphere for customers, to provide professional, hygienic, and attentive services.

TRAINING OUTPUT

32 of these were fully certified by the Centre, have graduated and have all been fully employed by elite families including governors and families of prominent political elites, organizations and companies across the country. One has gained scholarship in a University in the USA to undertake further studies in Hospitality Management. 4 voluntarily dropped during the training and 9 are currently undergoing 3-months further training to enable them reach a capacity level certifiable by the Centre.













JUSTICE AND HUMAN RIGHT DEPARTMENT







PROJECT GOAL

Strengthen Active Participation in Governance and Promote Human rights in Osun State.



OVERALL OBJECTIVES

To improve access to justice in Osun State through the implementation of the Administration of Criminal Justice Law (ACJL), functioning Community Based Out of court Mediation Committee and the establishment of two additional Juvenile Courts

PERIOD: JANUARY – DECEMBER, 2021

LEGAL AID Α.

I. Complaints

31 Complaints received on the following issues; Suspected rape of a girl, Denial of access to children, Public disturbance/nuisance, Divorce and child custody, Domestic violence, child maintenance, Fraud related matter, Debt recovery, Trespass, Breach of contract, Testate issues.

Actions taken in respect of the complaints are writing of Petition, ADR, legal counselling, referral to family court or other appropriate courts.

Of the 31 complaints, 16 were of family issues relating to rape, domestic violence, wife & children neglect, child custody and other related matters.

Kindly note that the complaints were just those formally lodged at the office. Some complaints were received orally.

From the complaint form filled, 13 complainants stated that they became aware of JDPMC through friends & family, 15 via radio, 1 via internet and one not specified.

II. Legal interventions

1. Nigeria Police Force, AIG Zone 11 – secured release and conclusion of a lady who is into the business of changing notes to mint. The sum of 1.5 million naira was stolen in the cause of transit.

- 2. Nigeria Security & Civil Defense Corps, Osun & Ondo States Commands lady who is into POS business was arrested on suspicion of fraudulent transaction. Secured her release and unfreezing of her bank account.
- 3. Nigeria Police Force, Osun State Command Office petition written to State Criminal Investigation Department
- 4. Osun Command in respect of the alleged defilement of a minor. Complaint initially lodged by the victim's mother at NPF, Oke-Bale Division without reasonable action taken, hence the petition. Facilitated the arrest, arraignment and remand of the suspect at the llesha Custodial Centre.
- 5. Nigeria Police Force, Ede Divisional Headquarters 2 matters at wherein we secured the release of a woman and her children who was arrested in lieu of her husband who defrauded the complainant of N7,000,000,00. The other being a suspected rape case which was later found not to be substantiated by evidence.
- 6. A petition was also written to NAPTIPP for investigation of the case of suspected trafficking in person against the woman.
- 7. Nigeria Police Force, Osun State Command office Secured the release of a man at the PRU, NPF, Osun State Command who was arrested on suspicion of receiving of stolen goods.
- 8. The department took up a case of child offenders involving an Igede trafficked girl and another girl of 15 years. Both were accused of stealing from the boss of the Igede girl at Ilesa garage, Osogbo.

III. Civil Litigations

B. ADVOCACY & COURTESY VISIT

1. Part of the team on advocacy visit to the Honourable Commissioner, Women, Children and Social Affairs. Issues concerning the family court discussed. The commissioner reported that the establishment of additional family court is being delayed by lack of fund as same was included in the year's budget but was removed.



2. Led the team on advocacy visit to the Commissioner of Police, Osun State Command. Issues partnership, training of NPF officers and human rights violations were discussed.



3. Paid advocacy visit to the State Comptroller, Nigeria Correctional Service, Osun State Command on partnership and training of their officer. This led not to just training of NCoS officer but also bridging the gap between them and the public through the radio programme.



4. The department received the Representatives of the Nigeria Correctional Service, Osun State Command (NCOS) on a courtesy visit. Issues relating to the Service and training of the Officers were discussed.

5. The welfare officers from Ilesa Custodial Centre visited to follow up on a child who was referred to Little Angels home, Jalemi pending the determination of his mother's fate by the court. The release of the child to Jaleyemi was by our intervention.

- 1. Regular visit to the custodial centres for inmates' interviews and welfare.
- 2. 1 intervention at the Ilesa Custodial Centre to secure the release of a child of one of the females awaiting trial inmates.
- 3. 2 inmates who completed the prison terms were supported by reconnecting them with their families and transportation back home.
- 4. Participated in the Chief Judge's visit to the Custodial Centres wherein 5 inmates wherein released at Ilesa and 3 at Ife

ACTIVITIES ON IMPLEMENTATION OF OSUN STATES ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE LAW

- 1. Training of legal practitioner: 19 lawyers from the various branches of the NBA in Osun State attended.
- 2. Training of Nigeria Correctional Service Officer: 15 Nigeria Correctional Service Corps officers from the Headquarters and Custodial Centres trained on the ACJL and NCS Act.
- 3. Training of Security Agents: Officers of the Nigeria Police Force, Osun state command from various divisions in the State and 5 officer of the Nigeria Security & Civil Defence Corps from the State Command.
- 4. Training and Inauguration of the ACJL Civil Society Observatory Group: Members of the group were trained and inaugurated. The members were drawn from the representatives of various NBA branches in the State, CSOs and prominent members of community. The Group shirts and Report templates were distributed. llesha and Ife NBA yet to be represented
- 5. Quarterly Meetings of the ACJL CSO observatory group: 2 quarterly meetings held with report submitted. Discussion held and resolution made on strategies to adopt for data collation.
- 6. Community Outreaches: Awareness Creation and Sensitization on the rights and duties under the ACJL held in 6 Communities which includes; Sekona, Ipetumodu, Ipetu-Ile, Ila-Ijesa, Erin-Osun, Ejigbo. At the outreaches, the King, queen, chiefs in council, representatives of CAN, Imam, Teachers, artisans, transporters and even Police & NSCDC present.



D. RADIO PROGRAMMES

Led the team on advocacy visit to the Commissioner of Police, Osun State Command. Issues partnership, training of NPF officers and human rights violations were discussed.



E. INTERNATIONAL HUMAN RIGHTS DAY

Theme for the year: HUMAN RIGHTS AS A FOUNDATION FOR PEACE

The day was commemorated with a public forum on Rave 91.7 fm with 3 panelists comprising of seasoned legal practitioner, women political influencer and a social services consultant. The general public were also involved through live calls.

F. OUT OF COURT MEDIATION

1. Central Justice System;

- 2 sessions of Out Court Mediation at O.A.U. T.H.C on how to make monthly deductions as ordered by the Family court from the salary of a staff of O.A.U.T.H.C of three children who abandoned the children with their maternal grandparents after the death of their mother. The legal and administrative officers were at the meeting frowned at the attitude of the man towards his children and promised to find a way to make the deduction for the maintenance of the children despite challenge posed by the IPPIS. The OCM was necessary in order to avoid filing of application for committal against their father wherein he can end up being jailed.
- 3 sessions held in respect of a breach of contract. The contract was on making furniture worth of N240,000.00. both parties already contracted their lawyers who exchanged letters and were on the verge of going to court before our intervention which brought about the amicable resolution of the disputes.
- 2 sessions held in respect of child maintenance. It involved a woman who relocated to Lagos with 4 children. Only 1 child was above 18 years. Resolution reached with the father agreeing to take care for the school fees and material of the children. The woman agreed to continue to be responsible for their accommodation and feeding.

2. Community Based out of Court Mediation Committees

Training and Inauguration of Community Based out of Court Mediation Committees: 5 new Community Based OCMs established in Ipetumodu, Ipetu – Ile, Idominasi, Igbajo, Erin-Osun. Both old and new committees were trained. We had 45 participants excluding only Osu Communities. Had the King of Okebode and Queen of Ipetu-ile as special guests. The Resources person was a seasoned Arbitrator from the State Citizens mediation centre at the Ministry of Justice.

Quarterly Visit to the Community Based out of Court Mediation Committees; Regular visits were made to the Community Based OCM Committees. Stipends were given and legal advice given when necessary. Noteworthy is that of Ipetu-Ile, while disputes was being resolved, the King invited us to the meeting for legal guidance. It was a disputes involving some members of the community, members of another community and the Police.





ACTIVITIES IN DETAILS

• Advocacy and Lobbying with stakeholders to embrace Children Protection; Not less than twelve different stakeholders were visited to inform them of our organization's activities on child protection and to solicit for collaboration on policy and structural reforms to accommodate holistic child protection in Osun state. Those visited were; Ministry of Women Affairs, Traditional leaders of Otan Ayegbaju and Iresi towns, Nigerian Security and Civil Defense Corps, Nigeria police Force, National Agency for Prohibition of Trafficking in Persons, etc. Some local government council managers were visited during the year to ensure that children are well catered for in their different communities under the leadership of the council managers.

- Mid Internal Evaluation Research with Children and Child Rights Advocates: The child rights program was appraised considering the views of children in the issues that concerned them. A thorough appraisal which involved 900 children was done (across the 30 LGAs of Osun state) to understand the thoughts of children on issues of education, security, basic needs, orphan-hood, child labour and the knowledge of structures available to protect them.
- End of Project Evaluation; The second phase of the Child right protection project supported by Kindermissionwerk Germany came to an end in the reporting year. The funding partner contracted an evaluation firm for the end of project evaluation, this was done intensively across six local governments areas of Osun state.



• Supervisory visits to the School Child's rights advocates in Schools (24 LGA) & School Outreach with special Children. The School based activities of the child's rights protection program was uninterrupted during the year 2021, though public schools were returned to the former form of 6-3-3-4, the child right's advocates school clubs were re-inaugurated in the schools. The major responsibility of the advocates were to refer fellow children dire in need of help to an adult in charge of the group, who would in turn, reach out to our organization.

Children with special needs celebrated during the course of 2021, the children's day celebration for children was done with these children, they danced and sang happily, over 100 children were in attendance.





Radio Program


36 weeks of radio program served as tools to enlighten the general public on the rights of children. Topical and trending issues that affected children were discussed by experts and resource persons. Topics usually being avoided were discussed such as the need to have a "Will" in the protection of the children.

• Training of 140 Caregivers on small Business Management and disbursement of money: the micro finance unit trained in batches 140 caregivers on small Business Management and money was disbursed to them to start their busineses, though two hundred and forty people were assessed. The disbursement is in categories in accordance with their capacity. The least payment is #50,000 naira.







Graduation / Economic Empowerment of Youths; 20 Vulnerable youths were exposed to different vocation/apprentice opportunities in year 2020, they completed their training periods and they were presented with the most important tool for their vocations. The youths have become entrepreneurs and through this gesture, they can combat socio economic challenges that faced them before the intervention.




Provision of Service Delivery (Legal, Medical, Nutritional support, etc to Vulnerable Children was the hall mark of the intervention to children in the year 2021, at least 80 children were reached with the different kinds of support throughout the year. School Levies of at least two hundred and fifty vulnerable children were also paid.





- Other Activities; The department was involved in other activities during the reporting period. Some of the activities were:

PROJECT OUTCOMES

- The Outcome and impacts of the child's right project assessed in line with the goals of the project.
- The education of the general populace about the rights of the children and the need for communal child protection.
- Children with Special needs were taught about their rights to boost their confidence and eliminate the tendency to accept of discrimination and poor self-esteem.
- 52 vulnerable households were supported to prevent the adverse effects of the economic crunch in Nigeria.
- The 20 youth were trained to have socio economic stability and to become employers of labour.
- The Capacity of the CSO were built to be able to respond to issues affecting children properly (in line with the best interest of the children.
- Children were given support and protected from the adverse effects of the challenges that made them need service delivery.


